




The Message of the Pussy Willow


On the way home, after a delicious meal prepared by Dr. Chen, (renowned Chinese chef from New York City) at the Blue Hill Lodge and Cafe, I thought I caught a glimpse of pussy willows out of the corner of my eye not far down the road, a little past Pappa's. Sure enough, just a little further down, there were several more bushes of Pussy Willows with their little furry catkins telling the other flora,

trees and bushes, "It's time to

wake up!"

Pussy willow is a name given to many of the smaller species of the genus Salix (willows and sallows) when their furry catkins are young in early spring. Before the male catkins of these species come into full flower they are covered in fine, greyish fur, leading to the idea, they are like tiny cats, also known as "little pussies". The catkins appear long before the leaves are noticeable.

Pussy willows are dioecious, having the male and female reproductive organs in separate individual plants and they are protandrous, having the male reproductive organs come to maturity before the female. There are male pussy willow trees and female pussy willow trees. The buds, or "catkins," on the male pussy willow trees usually appear earlier than do those on the females. Consequently, chances are that if you encounter a stand



The catkins of males yield numerous tiny staminate flowers typically consisting of a pollen-containing anther and a filament, later in spring. The female catkins will bear pistillate flowers, comprising the stigma, style, and ovary.

Pussy willow is highly variable in its identifying characteristics. Typically it grows as a shrub or small tree that may reach heights up to 30 feet. Willows, in general, grow rapidly and produce extensive root systems. Pussy willow trunks may be single or clustered with stout ascending branches and branchlets. Bark is slightly fissured and ridged. First-year pussy willow twigs are hairy but become glabrous or smooth with age. Pussy willow leaves are deciduous meaning they shed their leaves annually. The leaves are simple, and alternate. Leaf shape varies from oblong to elliptic, and blades are typically 2 to 5 times as long as they are wide.

Catkin buds are covered in dense silky hairs and are the best known pussy willow feature. Mature fruiting female catkins are typically 1 to 4.7 inches long, while mature fruiting male catkins measure 0.6

to 2 inches long.

Pussy willow trees are native to wetlands in the Catskills. They regenerate asexually by sprouting and sexually through seed production and germination. Pussy willow flowers are insect and wind pollinated and the small willow seeds are easily dispersed by wind

It is truly one of our most enduring indications of spring. And today, coming around the bend by the Neversink River in Claryville, lo and behold there were pussy willows just waiting to greet my spring-starved eyes.

It's well known, well documented fact that after World War II in Europe, many National Socialists . . . Nazism tried to avoid answering for their war crimes by fleeing to Argentina and Brazil. Others like Werner Von Braun and his racketeers from Peenemunde; a place that used slave labor from concentration camps in hidden underground factories to produce the V-one and V-two rockets which so devastated and terrorized London, were brought to America to be the progenitors of the American space effort. Still others were commandeered by the Soviet Union for their fledgling space and ballistic missile programs. All of that is common knowledge. But Ireland? Nazis' hiding in Ireland? Yep. Afraid tis' so. Ireland maintained an official government policy of neutrality in WWII, referring to it as the Emergency, and considered it a British problem. In spite of this, 100,000 Irishmen fought in the war with the British. After the war those soldiers faced criticism and prejudice... while some politicians looked the other way as a few Nazi warlords settled in to new lives in Erin. This week's MBR looks into this interesting and enlightening subject through the eyes of a talented young Irish novelist named Stuart Neville, who writes some of the best crime-fiction in the business. His newest one is *Ratlines*, (SOHO Crime, #26.95, 352 pages, ISBN 978-1-61695-204-4) and it takes place in 1963, just before president John F. Kennedy is due to make his historic trip to Ireland. Someone has been murdering Nazi collaborators in Ireland. Three foreign nationals have been killed execution style . . . within a few

days. All had collided with Hitler's minions during the war, and all have messages addresses to Colonel Otto Skorzeny; "Hitler's favorite commando,

The rescuer of Italian dictator Benito Mussolini from a mountaintop prison; a man who is currently living in Ireland. The messages are

all similar in style and say, "we are coming for you." The Minister of Justice, Charles Haughey, is concerned, fearing that the scandalous news could cancel the presidential visit, calls on Lieutenant Albert Ryan, of the Directorate of Intelligence to solve the case. Instructed by Haughey to quickly find the killers, Ryan, who fought Nazis and fascism in Europe and communists in Koreas as a British commando soon finds himself in a quandary. The deeper he digs, the more it appears that Haughey is either beholden to, or under

the control of Skorzeny . . . which makes Ryan a very conflicted characters. He's being forced to protect a sworn enemy instead of the country he's taken an oath to defend. With plenty of action along the way and no end of plot twists, this is a novel action-lovers do not want to miss. Another thrilling read from one of my favorite young Irish novelists and a man who's gaining daily recognition as one of the best crime fiction writers at work today.

movies, CD's and computer games to borrow for free? And, although not all libraries have eBook borrowing capabilities yet, if yours does, there's no late fees on borrowed eBooks? Municipal Solid Waste Tour for UC | Legislators and RRA Board Members

(Kingston, NY) Trash has nothing on this group of Ulster County Legislators, Resource Recovery Agency Board Members and Staff. A day long excursion to tour the Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Agency (OHSWA) was a lesson in state of the art processing of recycling materials and

regional solid waste management planning.
The trip, coordinated by the Ulster County Resource Recovery Agency, delivered Ulster County Legislators and Environmental, Energy, and Technology Committee members Tracey Bartels, Carl Belfiglio, Kenneth Wishnick and

Gilligan, and Executive Director Tim Rose, the group was amazed by an efficient single stream recycling facility which increased the waste product marketability by about ten percent. The technology to sort plastics by air, metal with a high powered magnet, and aluminum by eddy current was enlightening to witness first hand and can be seen online in OHSWA's part three video located http://www.ohswa.org/aboutus/ohswa-videos/. The .5 percent of recyclable material which was not sorted by this system offered a look into a highly effective community recycling program.

Technology Committee Chair Belfiglio stated, "Ulster County needs to look at every option in our Solid Waste Management Plan and what better place to

start than a successful plan already implemented at Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Authority."

As the tour progressed to the municipal owned landfill, the group learned more about this zero net service fee operation, its municipal contracts for solid waste that offered discounted tipping fees, a

sub-contracted waste transportation program for solid waste disposal from transfer station to landfill, a GPS system that allowed for rout-ing decisions and improved communication with the local communities, as well as a plan for contin-ued reduction of tipping fees for solid waste disposal.

After many questions were asked and answered, the group began the two and half hour ride home, having traveled almost the same distance as the daily solid waste dis-

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
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The Olive Jar - Carol LaMonda Cell Phones

At the April 18 dinner meeting of the Town of Fallsburg Lions Club, School Superintendent Dr. Ivan Katz and Business Official Dan Grecco gave a brief but detailed presentation on the proposed 2013-2014 School Budget. The proposed increase of \$1,104,833 or 3.11% over last year's budget includes an added Pre-K teacher due to increased enrollment in that program; a high school language teacher to meet new State requirements; a second School Resource Police Officer on campus for added safety, and cross-country track alterations to supplement the design and development that retired Health Education teacher Brian performed through his generosity and donations of money and time. The proposed tax levy increase is 0.79%.

Dr. Katz, in a short video and in a question and answer session with the forty members and guests present, discussed Proposition 2 for a Capital Project on repair of the district's current facilities. The video shows the details and extent of the existing conditions of deterioration. The total cost of the capital project will not exceed \$11,000,000. Monies are coming from a combination of a portion of the undesignated fund balance that the district has already saved and from 67.5% NY State building aid. Dr. Katz emphasized that there would be no cost to the taxpayer!

Some of the critical repairs needed are a result of the age of the two main buildings in the district, water penetration and deterioration to the building envelopes, includ-ing roofs not repaired or replaced in 2006, flooring and walls that have resulted in damages to building finishes over time. Many of the repairs will result in improved health and safety issues and save on heating costs over the

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



UC Comptroller Elliott Auerbach Estimates on Tax Sale

According to Ulster County Comptroller Elliott **Invites** Auerbach, the auction of properties seized by Ulster **State** County for back taxes took in approximately \$1.5 million to \$1.8 based on early calculations.

UC Comptroller Auerbach, some of the parcels sold for amounts that were appreciably higher than the amount of taxes owed on them.

"One that may have had \$20,000 worth taxes owed on it sold for \$95,000 in the Town of Gardiner and one that had \$40,000 or \$45,000 worth of taxes on it sold for \$145,000 and I believe that was in the Town of Marbletown," Auerbach said.

Not all the properties sold at the auction. It was estimated that if they were all sold that as much as \$2.5 million could have been garnered.

Assembly Equal Pay for Equal Work Package

(Albany, New York) Asemblymember Kevin Cahill (D-Ulster, Dutchess) helped to pass three pieces of legislation out of the New York State Assembly today which would strengthen Equal Pay protections for women and minorities in the public and private sectors alike.

"According to a 2013 study by the National Committee on Pay Equity, women working full time, year round, make only 77 cents for every dollar that a typical male makes - and it gets even worse for women of color who earn anywhere from 62 to 54 cents for every dollar. There is no reason for this enormous gap in salaries between men and women, some of whom work side by side. It is imperative that we help end wage discrimination," said Cahill.

To help achieve pay equity for all New Yorkers, Assemblymember Cahill voted today in favor of:

 A. 5958 (Heastie) Covering both private and public sectors, the Fair Pay Act would provide protection for all employees working in traditionally female job titles in New York State.

 A. 1729 (Jaffee) This bill seeks to ensure that each public sector employer in New York State pays non-biased compensation to job titles that have equivalent value.

• A. 753 (Rosenthal) This legislation requires the State to maintain equal pay for comparable worth for state employees in job titles where women and people of color predominate, and provides enforce-

"First and foremost, pay equity is about fairness The Catskill Watershed Corporation (CWC) for all people," Assemblymember Cahill said. "I urge the Senate and Governor to join in, advancing

these important pieces of legislation, which have passed the Assembly year after year. Their passage will help put an end to work-related discrimination and make New York a leader in wage fairness for others to follow."

 State Route 177 over North Branch of Sandy Creek in the Town of Rodman, Jefferson County: The bridge will remain in service during construction utilizing a temporary traffic signal. Work on this \$2.3 million project is expected to be completed by late fall.

 State Route 193 Bridges over I-81 northbound and southbound in the Town of Ellisburg, Jefferson County: Work will include armor joint repairs, and highway approach work to the bridges to improve sight distance and turning radii at the bridges. The bridges will be closed during construction and the detour will utilize adjacent interstate exits. Work on the \$1.5 million project is expected to begin in May and be completed by late fall.

New York State Department of Transportation Commissioner Joan McDonald said, "Replacing these bridges and bridge decks will increase safety for motorists and enhance mobility along important travel corridors across the state.
